		Birth Certificate	This must be a <u>full certified copy</u> of an entry of birth (the names
		Copie Intégrale d'Acte de	of the parents must be stated).
		Naissance	If the certificate originates from France, it must be less than 3
			months old from the date of the wedding.
			If the certificate was delivered out of France, for example in the
			UK, then it must be <u>less than 6 months old</u> from the date of the wedding.
		Proof of address <i>Justificatifs de Domicile</i>	Similar to proof required for the UK, this can be a Council Tax bill, Bank Statement, etc. One must be submitted for both the bride and the groom, although a joint document may be used if featuring both names on it.
		Proof of ID	Similar to proof required for the UK, such as a copy of your
		Preuve de l'Identité	passport.
		Certificate of No Impediment / Sworn Statement / Affidavit	This can be obtained by British nationals from their local registry office.
		Attestation sur l'Honneur	If you are a French national, or have dual nationality, as long as you have a French ID, you may not require this from the UK. Instead you will need to fill in a French form provided to you by the <i>Mairie</i> .
		List of Witnesses	You will need a minimum of two witnesses, up to a maximum of four.
		Liste des Témoins	They will also need to provide proof of address and ID, specifically providing their first names, surnames, date and place of birth, occupation and address. They must all be over the age of 18.
		Where the groom and/or the bride are not French	In the case of British nationals, <u>all</u> documents <u>must</u> be translated, <u>and</u> their translation must be <u>verified</u> by a solicitor registered with the Law Society in the UK. The document is then submitted to the <u>Foreign and</u> <u>Commonwealth Office</u> to be <u>apostilled</u> . Make sure you allow time for this to take place and to be able to submit your documents within the required six month period.
		Certificate of publication and non-opposition <i>Certificat de Publication et de</i> <i>Non-Opposition</i>	These will be provided by the <i>Mairie</i> once they have received all of the above documents.

Additional Do	ocuments:	
For those who	already have children	You will need to inform the <i>Mairie</i> of this, as well as produce the children's birth certificates, dated <u>less than</u> <u>3 months old</u> from the date of the wedding. Alternatively, you may provide them with a copy of your <i>Livret de Famille</i> if you have one.
If one of the p	arties is a widower	A death certificate of the former spouse must be produced, or a birth certificate confirming the death.
If one of the p	arties is divorced	In the case of British nationals, a Decree Absolute, along with its translation in French (which can be legalised as well).
	<i>Contrat de Mariage</i> ntract) has been made	You will require a Solicitor's certificate where you have set up a Mariage Contract / prenuptial agreement.
